

Timeline for removing barriers to overseas products







Ensuring granny flats are safe, healthy and durable



- Proposed new Schedule, with conditions
- Single-storey, new, standalone dwelling up to 60 m²
- Includes conditions on:
 - Height
 - Height to boundary
 - Protection from fire
 - Structure, external moisture and wind zones
 - Plumbing work
 - Who can do the work (design and build)
 - Notification of work to council



Increasing the uptake of remote inspections

- Guidance published on 31 July
- Public consultation on a range of options later this year (likely late September)
- Policy development informed by feedback received during 2023 Building Consent System Review







NZS 3604 Timber-framed buildings

NZS 3604 202X

- Public consultation originally planned for August 2024
 - Standards New Zealand have indicated completion for working groups is likely late October/November 2024
 - Public consultation now in early 2025
- The draft edition will correct 300+ errors in current NZS 3604:2011
- It will be better placed to address issues of durability.
- Framing and concrete foundation provisions will incorporate an extension to 3 storey buildings.





Update on life-cycle assessments

Aug 2020: Whole of life embodied carbon emissions reduction framework

Feb 2022: Whole of life embodied carbon technical assessment methodology

Nov 2023: Exemplar assessments

The documents are **voluntary guidance**, and have not been introduced into the Building code.

There are no requirements from 2025.
